






> Between the security of childhood and the insecurity of the second childhood, we found the fascinating group of humans called Cowboys.








A Successful Homecoming



The Warriors outlasted the Wildcats 25-16 to celebrate a victorious Homecoming.









Glaser. Lori Whisenhunt and Cindy Glaser were also chosen for 2nd team All District forwards. Marion Dunlap received an honorable mention.




She has also taken the Spanish Club to Mexico several times. Miss E. has been the teacher of several subjects but Spanish is her main one.

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Central Systems

- 1. Set thermostat on 78°, or higher.
- 2. Have equipment checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
- 3. Check filter every 30 days. Clean or replace when dirty.
- 4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
- 5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out sunlight.
- 6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
- 7. Proper home insulation keeps heat out, cuts energy use.
- 8. Weatherstrip doors and windows. Caulk cracks.
- 9. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

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Follow above suggestions, plus these:

- Buy units with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity.
- 11. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
- 12. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.

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



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
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



