

nominee. It was fun though after all these years we finally won the Homecoming Spirit Stick. It is something I will remember forever," Sarah beth Ruffner, Sr. said.


On the Friday before Halloween, the cheerleaders, flag corps, twirler, and some of the drill team switched uniforms and places to perform a skit.




After the float judging, the sophomores and freshmen deadlocked for first place, followed by the juniors in second and the seniors in third.


Friday night came to an end with a win over the Pottsboro Cardinals and the crowning of the princesses and queen.


"The show was very interesting because there was a wide variety of good musical talent," Timmy Gilstrap, Sr. said.





"It was nice to have something else to do at the breakfast besides dancing. I thought everything was really cute and well planned by the senior parents," Lana Clayton jr.










The class of '94 now proudly holds their high school diplomas.










The first six weeks of school, PAL studied diligently to learn how

The *Totem Poll* reflected what students felt about the world around them. There were articles on Drugs, fads, and

every UIL event imaginable.

"This years news coverage has been great. I think we've done a good job of reporting what happened around school," said Brad Underwood, soph.

The Totem Poll staff concluded its year with the biggest paper they had produced yet. The Senior paper was 16 pages long, and encompased not only the normal news and feature stories, but also the Last Wills and Testaments of the Class of 1994.




"The practices were very tiring. We had to work a long time and had to do everything perfect." said Amanda Fanning, Soph.

















" We had been picked to finish low in the district and there were some who thought we wouldn't do well, but we came back and played consistently to tie for second place in district," said head coach Steve













"The track team was better this year because the girls were more diciplined, but the atmosphere was still relaxed," said Coach Bob Onstott.

















The work was done by the students and supervised by the teachers and two engineers on loan from TI.

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


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
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Bonham High School Coushatta Volume 57 was printed by Josten's Publishing Company Box 1903, Topeka, Kansas 66601.


