



Lunchroom Crowding becomes inconvenient for the increased student population

With the arrival of 180 freshman and an enrollment of 520, the halls and cafeteria became extremely crowded this year. The decision was made to divide the students into three different lunches. 





"We were looking for one of the items when a senior knocked Chris Pendergrass down and we lost the point and the seniors got ahead of us," said sophomore Jason Walker.




"I really liked decorating the halls because it was really fun to look at all the other ideas," said freshmen Melissa Collins.



Camper turns counselor after years of experience at Lions Club Crippled Childrens Camp

Food fights, camping, swimming, and freedom sounds like the ideal summer vacation. Willie Reeder got to do all this and get paid at the same time.

This past summer, Willie was a counselor at the Texas Lions Club Camp for handicapped and diabetic children in Kerrville, Texas. Handicapped children come from all over Texas to spend two weeks at camp.

After the children arrive at camp, they cannot call home and no family member can call them. The camp encourages both the parents and campers to write. The parents are allowed to send care packages full of goodies.

This is usually a first time experience for both the campers and parents. Willie has been a camper since the age of seven. When he turned 16, he was able to qualify as counselor. In

order to be a counselor he had to be able to take care of himself and someone else.

"I had to go through a week long training session. I studied Red Cross training (which includes CPR and Heimlich Technique) risk management (not allowing the young, first-time campers to shower alone in wheel chairs and staying close so if they fall out you can assist them) and of course, sign language," Willie said.

As a counselor, Willie had many responsibilities. According to Willie, they had to help kids that needed it and watch to make sure they didn't hurt themselves or someone else.

Much to Willie's delight, he was paid for doing what he loved-helping people and making friends at the same time. Willie made a lot of special friends with which he still keeps in touch.

"Sometimes we'd take our wheelchairs down to the water and just roll out as far as we could until we had to swim," Willie said. "Other times we'd have food fights. It was a mess, but the counselors let us have fun and be kids. Everyone laughed and had a great time. The watermelon fight was unforgettable."

Camp was a place to be totally himself. To Willie and the other campers, camp was the real world. No one is treated specially at camp because they are handicapped; it's the norm.

"The most memorable thing about camp was all of the fun we had working at camp; we could act crazy as we wanted to," Willie said.

Willie had a summer job full of fun, but it was also full of hard work. This is one summer job he will never forget.






Then there are those who just want to stay home.


"On the weekends I usually go to the Family Life Center and play basketball, games in the game room, or just sit around and enjoy myself," said Shaneco Finney, Jr.

meals, weight lifting, body toning, and aerobic classes, as well as a variety of children's activities available weekly.


"I really enjoy the center I spent most of my summer up at the center playing, and now that I'm up there every Tuesday for scouts, I use even more," said Jason Walker, soph.



Rodeo no easy sport or cheap investment for high school cowboys and cowgirls

Almost every Friday and Saturday night while others are enjoying riding around, going to movies, others are loading their trailors and heading for a rodeo.

"Almost every weekend Stoney and I go roping in some town in Texas or Oklahoma all tear around, "Tim McMillen, Jr. said. "I belong to the CRA (Central Rodeo Association) and TXHS (Texas High School Rodeo Association) circuits."

On November 4, 1994, Stoney Skidmore and Tim McMillen attended the PYRA (Professional Youth Rodeo Association) awards banquet in Stephenville, Texas to pick up their winnings. Tim won the championship header buckle in team roping. Stoney won the second place heeler buckle. They also recieved jackets and athletic bags.

The only girl on the circuit from BHS is Courtney Clark, Fresh., who won the NBHA district championship for 2D in barrel racing last August. She also placed sixth in state competition.

"I practice year around everyday if the weather permits for about 1 1/2 or 2 hours at the arena at my house," Courtney Clark said, "and I rodeo 2 to 3 weekends each month."

This sport does not come inexpensively for these cow-

boys and cowgirls. Entry fees for each rodeo event are \$50.

I have 1,200 - 15,000 dollars invested in my equipment," Courtney said. Tim said he had about \$12,000 invested in his horse, trailor, saddle and, ropes.

"There are others who rodeo on a regular basis during the school year and in the summer. Team ropers are Michael Garcia, and John Caldwell. Jesse Clark, Justin Lawson, and Clint Dodson are bull riders.

The bullriders often practice at Coach Larry McFarlin's house at the buckout sessions on Sunday nights.

Working studying, going to shool prepares students for real world

For many students, jobs are an important part of their lives. Some rely on their jobs as a source of income, while others work just to earn a little extra spending money.

The Marketing Distributive Education program (M.D.E.) helps students who want to work half a day and go to school. M.D.E. also teaches them job skills and Mr. Tim Davis, the M.D.E. director, helps students find the jobs that they need.

The students work at many different places of employment and working hours vary between each person. "I am also in the M.D.E. program. I work at Wal-Mart about twenty five to thirty hours a week. I attend school until 12:15 and then I usually work from 5:00 to 10:00," said Sr Joe Russell.

There are many students who have jobs, however which are not in the M.D.E. program. Some of these students find it difficult to balance time for their jobs and for their schoolwork.

"I work at Sonic about thirty six hours a week. I am not in M.D.E. therefor I go to school full time and then I go to work. After work, I still have to find time to study and do my homework," said Sr. Jeremy Bruce.



career in finances and international relations and a career as an attorney.











Mrs. Hunnicutt, instructor of English II and English II Honors, has her students read <u>The Adventures of Tom Sawyer</u>, and <u>To Kill A Mockingbird</u>.

All freshman English I classes are taught by Mr. Kountz who

requires them to read Romeo and Juliet.

"In Mrs. Reece's SEARCH I and II classes we are required to read Frankenstein, The Grapes of Wrath, The Turn of the Screw, Romeo and Juliet, One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, A Separate Peace, The Pearl, The Old Man and the Sea, The Adventures of Tom Sawyer (SEARCH I), and To Kill AMockingbird (SEARCH II), "Jared Warren said.



"You mean I need 24 credits by May 26? Is it too late to drop to the General Plan?"

When entering Bonham High School students must decide between three plans to follow in order to graduate. These plans include the General, Advanced, and Honors programs. The General and Advanced plans my be entered by anyone wishing to do so, but in order to enter the Honors program, a student has to be able to make and maintain higher grades than those students on the other two plans.

Under the General program, students are required to complete a minimum of 22 courses in order to receive a diploma. To fulfill these requirements, a student has to have four English courses, three courses of Mathematics, two courses

of Science, and two and a half courses of Social Studies which include World History or Geography, U. S. History and Government. Students also have to complete one semester of Economics, one and a half years of P. E., one semester of Health, and eight elective courses.

Students entering the Advanced plan must also complete four courses of English, three advanced Math courses which can be chosen from Algebra I, II, Geometry, or other advanced class, one and a half years of P.E., two and a half years of Social Studies, one semester of Economics, and one semester of Health. In addition to these, students must also complete three Science courses, two foreign language courses from the same language, one

course of Computer Science, chosen from Computer Math, Advanced Typing/Word Processing, or Business Computer Applications, one course of Fine Arts, chosen from band, Choir, Art, Theater, or Public Speaking, and four courses of Electives for a combined total of 24 units.

Students who wish to enter the Honors program must fulfill all the requirements necessary for students on the Advanced plan with the exception that at least five classes must be honors classes. These five courses can be chosen from English I, II, III, and IV, World and US History, Economics, Government, Biology, and Physical Science.















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














