The first editorial of the East Texan will be devoted to outlining the plans of the staff and the purposes of the paper.

Our next purpose is to furnish as much as possible, news and information that will be of interest to ex-students who subscribe, and to parents of students who are now attending our school.

From time to time we will instigate movements to bring about conditions that will be for the best interests of the school. However at no time will there be any personal attacks on individuals or the school administration. All such instigations will be furthered only with the consent of the faculty advisory committee.

We want the students to feel that this is their paper and if at time they feel that the staff is not running the paper properly come and tell us about it. We will be more than glad to make any changes that will be to the best interests of the East Texan.

We urge the students to send in articles that will be interesting to the other students. Next week we will start a new column which we will call the "Heeler's Corner." In this column will be published articles turned in by students. A heeler is one who goes out for news. News does not mean simply incidents that happen on the campus. It means themes, essays, personal opinions. In short any phase of information that will be interesting to the readers. Only one a week will be published. That being the best one turned in. At the end of the year a prize and a writeup in the East Texan will be awarded to the student whose articles have been the best and accepted the most number of times.

The ones who expect to compete for this prize get busy, and be sure to turn your copy some time on Wednesday of every week.

We hope to make the East Texan one of the best, if not the best school paper in the state. With the cooperation of every student and faculty member we can succeed. The East Texan will be the "prophet, historian and herald of E. T. in all her glory."
