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WOMEN'S PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT TEACHING PROPER METHODS OF GROUP EXERCISE

"We are trying out a new system of class arrangement in the Women's physical education department," Miss Harriet Rogers, head of the department, said Tuesday, and it promises to work better than any we have had so far. We have rearranged all the courses and re-organized the whole department.

The rearrangement has grouped all Freshmen together in different sections. They no longer choose certain classes. We try to correct this idea by teaching as many different phases of this work as possible, and as many different activities.

Team games make up the largest portion of activities in the fall. Of these, soccer and good ball are the most important. The department also offers relay, stunting games, and informal group games. As the weather gets more disagreeable, tumbling, gymnastics, work, marching and lectures, corrective and general gymnastics, take the places of the outdoor games. The teaching of Danish, folk and national dancing, aesthetic and natural dancing is an important part of the winter program. The main team games such as basketball, volleyball, croquet, tennis and quilt tennis are most popular in the spring and summer classes.

"After having completed this season's Freshman course, sophomores may choose the types of activities they desire as their physical education work. We are working toward the development of the right attitude rather than the development of skill. It is our aim to make the girls really like their courses, and continue some type of exercise after they have graduated," continued Miss Rogers.

Many of the sophomores have been calling for top dancing, and Miss Rogers plans to teach it this winter.

Miss Davis gives physical examinations to the girls, suggesting special lines of activity for those able to take regular courses. Volley ball, minor sports, hiking, football games, individual corrective work and rest are prescribed by the nurse. It is the greatest desire of the physical education department to add a doctor to its staff thus fulfilling the requirements for a standard college.

"The Women's Athletic Association is doing a most valuable work on this campus. It gives those

who desire more physical exercise a chance for pleasant recreation," continued Miss Rogers. The organization meets an hour each day with hiking on Monday, dancing on Tuesday, skating and archery on Wednesday, soccer and team games on Thursday, and tennis on Friday.

"Our equipment is quite complete with the exception of the lockers and dressing rooms. The library especially shows up well in comparison with the physical education libraries of other colleges on our side." Miss Rogers has just purchased some new gym equipment including a climbing rope, jump standards, victrola records, and a thirty-six inch case ball for mass games.

Burenia Johnson and Evelyn Pruitt, spring graduates, are the physical education majors this year.

"This is only the third year that we have offered a major in this department," Miss Rogers said. "And we had two majors who graduated this past summer."

For majors the physical education department works with the Biology, Home Economics, and music departments. The girls are advised to take physiology, general biology, cooking, dietetics, and music.
