University Receives Painting of Savior From Mexican Artist

First Work Of Its Kind To Be Presented to Texas Collection.

AUSTIN, Texas, June 12.—A devotional oil painting from Puebla, Mexico, depicting Christ and his disciples, has been presented to the archives of the University of Texas library by Miss Mary Carroll of San Antonio. The painting is the first of its type to be given to the archives.

"Christ Taking Leave of His Disciples," is the title of the picture, dedicated as a memorial to D. Nicolas Garcia de Figueroa. The artist did not sign his name, and according to Mrs. Mattie Austin Hatcher, architect, it was evidently painted as a memorial and hung in a church. There is no date on the painting, but marks and condition of the canvas indicated that it

is quite old.
Soft shades of red are used for the robes of the disciples, and bright blue is used for the capes which are thrown loosely over the right shoulders of the men. Christ is in the center of the picture, blessing a disciple who is kneeling at his feet. The other disciples are gathered about Christ, weeping and giving farewell.

"We hope this gift will be the beginning of a great collection of similar fine oil paintings," Mrs. Hatcher said. "It is the hope of this University that a collection can be obtained that will bring about appreciation of good art."

The picture will be hung in the archives room, along with two fine old Spanish oil paintings.

County Basketball And Baseball Are Organized For Summer Months

SUMMER SPORT TALKS

Well, well, well—another week has rolled around and it is time for the summer students to know something about what is happening in the sports circle for the summer term. Everything is well underway around the Cub gym, according to Uncle Jimmy Williams, chief executive around the athletic fields.

The Cub gym, in which we had to retreat, is not so bad after all. It is just a little small for school teachers, and especially for the style in which they play. It is sometimes termed as football being played without the padded pants and the rubber cleats. Whether it is or not, it at least feels that way.

Since the student body has organized several soft ball teams and also the younger members of the faculty, it seems that the older members of the faculty would get some enjoyment out of the great sport. They would soon get over the sore and stiff stage, and it might do some of them some good or at least they would be carrying out the request of the president.

HITT AND SIKES TO CAPTAIN LIONS IN 1934 AND 35 SEASON

Students, teachers, and patrons of East Texas State Teachers College look forward to the coming fall when the King Texas Lions will attempt to retain the football crown that they wear at the present time. It does play any part in athletics the Lions have a bright chance to repeat. Last years conference win for they have a bright outlook at the present. Last season the Lions power and strength was due to a great extent to the work of R. D. Hitt. This season the Lion eleven will be captained by this same hard-hitting, pigskin carrier. Hitt is a worthy captain and has the backing of the united squad. He's out of the United States. The man who has been selected to captain the 1935 edition of the East Texas basketball squad is one of the best guards in the Lone Star Conference and is an all-conference man. Adol Sikes is the logical man to lead the basketballers to next year's victory and has displayed the fighting ability that it takes to go places. Sikes has won two letters in basketball and the same in football.

With these two men succeeding:

Each club will play two days per week and each sport will count 1-2 hour on the required physical education. Those who take both basketball and baseball will receive one full year's credit.

The baseball, under the direction of Coach J. W. Rollins, will meet on Mondays and Thursdays from 6:30 to 8:00, and will be seven inning games. There will be no batting practice. The club may play at the same time. All equipment will be furnished by the college.

Coach J. V. Sikes will have charge of the basketball games which will be played in the Cub gymnasium.

Here are some of the rules as laid down by Coach Rollins: First, no spikes or cleats of any kind will be permitted. Second, the players are not to use gloves. Third, a nine-inch ball will be used. Fourth, the players will not argue with the umpire. Fifth, there is to be no blood-thirsty spirit developed between the teams. Sixth, the games will be seven innings. Seventh, those participating in the league will not be permitted to change teams after they have played with one team.

Mr. Rollins expressed an especial desire that there be plenty burbling during the games in order that the interest may run higher.

This should be one of the most successful seasons the league has ever had because there is a larger group of material from which to draw the personnel of the teams.

The faculty representatives will probably have a more difficult race this year than last for every other team in the league will strive to be the one that wears the 1934 crown.

CUB GYMNASIUM RECEIVES NEW IMPROVEMENTS

Since the headquarters of the men's physical education department had to be established in the Cub gymnasium it was found necessary to make many improvements for the work to be carried on there.

James LeNoir, student carpenter, and Jim Bleslow, college carpenter, are at work constructing rows of seats at the south and north ends of the gymnasium for the benefit of the spectators at the summer basketball contests. New lockboards have also been constructed of hardwood lumber to replace the battered and weak pine ones. The shower room has been greatly improved by the installation of three new showers and more sanitary equipment.

A new water fountain, like those in the Library building, will be installed in the north end of this institution to offer players and spectators sanitary cold water.
