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Lions and Eagles to Battle for Championship; Special Train Will Carry Fans To Denton Saturday

Trip Will Begin at 8:00 A.M.


Fare Will Be \$4.14; **Ogimas Sell Tickets**

For the first time since 1941 a special train will roar out of Commerce Saturday morning bound for Denton. A traditional part of the fes-A traditional part of the fes-tivities surrounding the ET-NT grudge clash the special will be the sixth to carry Lion fans to Denton since the Lone Star Confer-ence was formed in 1932. The train is scheduled to

leave Commerce at 8:30 a. m. Saturday, and will arrive in Denton around 11 o'clock that morning, giving its passengers plenty of time to at 2:30 p. m. The return trip will get underway at o'clock Saturday night.

Fare for the round trip will be \$4.14, which is considerable increase over previous costs for the trip. The higher fare is due to the government's failure to restore the special rates that were in effect before the war for this type train. The rates were suspended early in 1942 to aid the scrambled wartime transportation mixup, and the railroads' petition for restoration of the special fares has not yet been granted.

Advanced ticket sales are being pushed by the Ogima club, sponsors of the train, in order to assure railroad officials that de_ mand for the train is great
