People Have Wrong Idea Of Be Bop

Most people hold a misconception of what true BE BOP music is, many don't care, and that's all right, too, but as the great educator, J. A. Elliott, once said: "Woe be to the uneducated."

The layman's idea of BE BOP is the record made by Tex Benecke entitled, "Hey Boy a Re Bop" which is nothing more than a commercialized chant of a slang phrase originated by musicians, to describe the mad music that J. "Dizzy" Gillespie plays. "Dizzy" is well known to the jazz lovers of the present but this is about as far as his notoriety extends. Much has been written about this relatively new style of jazz by authorities; I have read some of this, listened to some of the BE BOP advocates and am still in an uncertain state of mind as to a good definition of it.

Extreme Technician

The foremost advocate of BE BOP is the aforementioned Gillespie. This young, colored trumpet player is an extreme technician, with ideas that even exceed his technique. It would be a waste of your time for me to try to tell you how he plays; if you are interested get one of his records, something like, "One Bass Hit" or "Night in Tunisia" and you will get the epitome of BE BOP. His peculiar "stop rhythm" is fascinating to listen to and much more enjoyable to watch. His whole band jumps on the beat and leaves you with the impression that they are inspired by Dizzy's leads. At times during his solos you will think he has hit a discord; then he will follow with another, and you know how abstract he really plays.

It should also be noted here some more advocates of BE BOP, Charlie "Bird" Parker, Coleman Hawkins and the late, great Sonny Berman—the Woody Herman trumpet man who lead the orchestra into the difficult trumpet passages that highlight his records of "Northwest Passage" and "Apple Honey." Everybody has heard of "Body and Soul" and agrees that it's fine, but listen to a record with Dizzy and Coleman playing this BE BOP and you will get your kicks.

Coach Bob Berry's Lion tracksters pulled the cinder-path upset of the year at Houston Saturday by walking away with the Lone Star Conference track and field meet.

Carlos Salinas won first places in both the 100 and 220-yard dash and completed on two relay teams to accumulate 11 3-4 of the Lions 48 1-5 points. Behind the Blue and Gold cindermen were Stephen F. Austin with 33 1-2 points, and North Texas, the defending champ, with 29 1-2 points. Southwest Texas finished in fourth spot with 26 7-10 tallies, while Sam Houston accounted for 17 1-5 points. Following were the University of Houston squad with 9 1-5, and Trinity university with a lone tally.

Had the wind not been blowing and if the track had been in better condition, time on most track events would have been faster.

East Texas won first places in five events and placed in 12 of the 15 events.
