FOUR MEN TRY TO BREAK JAIL MONDAY NIGHT

Cooper, Tex. July 10.—A jail break was narrowly averted Monday night when Deputy Sheriff McKay brought seven men busy, engaged in sawing the steel bars into which the prisoners out of their cell into the run-around out of their way easily.

Mr. McKay had just been to the jail to take some home brew he had taken from a negro Monday night, and was preparing to return to town when two negro prisoners yelled and informed him of what the four men were attempting. The negroes were: Phil Connolly, who is facing a five-year term in the penitentiary for murder, and John Henry Felder, who is charged with assault to murder.

The men attempting to escape had steel saws and when successful had already completely sawed through seven of their cell bars and were nearly through the eighth. Officers say that if five more minutes the men would have been at liberty.

Officers obtained the information that while a man was talking to the four prisoners in the jail, they dropped a note to him telling him to purchase the saws and when he replied that he had the money they supplied him with that.

The man immediately picked up some old saws and bought several new ones at a local hardware store. He then stuck the saws in a sack of bread, which was drawn up to the cell and the men immediately began sawing the bars.

The plans were traced to the local hardware store and the name of the man who bought them was obtained. He was arrested and is present in jail charged with assisting jailbreak.

(Continued from page 1) Each paper should be accompanied by an outline of a table of contents if the notes have been taken on cards. It will be an easy matter to group related items to make the large divisions of the essay.

VI. Writing the essay. Rules of correct English must be applied. The student should be advised to prevent the facts he has discovered and his interpretation of them in a pleasing style. It is not absolutely necessary to be dull in order to prove that you can write. The length of the essay will be a measure by which the student will be determined by the subject in general. It may be said that the subject should be broad enough to require 300 words to develop accurately. All essays must be typed.

VII. Footnotes and bibliography. All questions in the paper must be supported by some authority or source, and each entry must be accompanied by a bibliography of all material used. For footnote reference technique and for the technique of the bibliography the best source is Tyson, "The Teaching of History," pp. 145-146.

IX. Content. Original source material must be the main substance of the essay articles. A rehash of essays or pamphlets on themselves which have already appeared in print will not be acceptable.

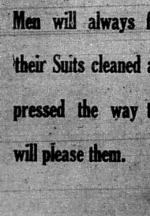
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
