Three Health Officers Assigned East Texas

Longview, Texas, April 8.—Announcement that three health workers from the United States Public Health Service will be assigned to duty in East Texas and will be based at the Chamber of Commerce headquarters here was made by A. LePrince, senior chief sanitary engineer of the national health service, following Governor Ross R. Sterling's endorsement of the malaria-control bill for East Texas. The bill, which provides \$50,000 for malaria-control work in the eastern section of Texas, was signed by the governor Friday.

The health workers from the

national service will include a medical director, a sanitary engineer and a technician.

A malaria laboratory to be the only one of its kind in Texas, will be set up at Longview. Other work such as emergency will be done by the laboratory, which, however, will not do general laboratory work. This latter phase will be completed as in the past, by the State Department of Health and private laboratories.
