Maughan's clever study of the wife who deals with her philandering husband in an exceedingly effective way will be the next play of the Little Theatre. Most wives would have wept, raves, applied for a divorce—but not "Constance"; she knew all the time that "John" was unfaithful, but she liked "Marie-Louise"; the ending is clever. You are the object of his passing fancy. He becomes the means of handing out a full measure of justice to the errant husband, who grows unamed, indignant, and sassy hurt.

"The Constant Wife" is left—so the curtain falls—with a little question in your minds. Did "Constance" pay back "John's" unfaithfulness, by realising quite often was "Bernard", hence have no real reason to make a fuss if the husband wanders from the straight and narrow? She believed that the situation hinges on the economic phase—in other words, if a man pretend that she doesn't know that "John" is not the ideal husband, she will not give any indication that she suspects the truth. But in Act II the affair is brought into the open, and she is compelled to acknowledge that she has known all the time about "John's" wandering off on carefree. BOOK REVIEWS

DR. MUNTHE TALKS ABOUT HIMSELF — AND HAS A WORD TO SAY ABOUT BOOK-PUBLISHING JOURNALISTS AND THE AMERICANS WHO SEEK HIM OUT WITH SAN MICHELE'S THEIR HANDS.

According to an interviewer who recently talked to Dr. Axel Munthe, famous author of "The Story of San Michele," and whose interview with the doctor was published in Tidm's Tidsskrift, Norway. Dr. Munthe is working on a new book to be called "Death and The Doctor." But he told the interviewer, "I hope I may be able to withstand the temptation to publish it. I am writing it in English, of course, as all my other books were written in English."

"Death interests me," said Dr. Munthe, "and very much so, now that I am nearing 70. Death and blindness are struggling to possess me. Which one will reach me first I do not know."

Dr. Munthe is now living in the suburb, Sveden, in Rome. The reporter met him on the street leading up to his residence. When stopped the doctor said tartly in English, "It was just to avoid you that I went out."

"But now I must go to Bordeaux," he remarked abruptly. "If you wish to talk to me you will have to come along. I must walk many hours a day to get rid of sleeplessness. It is also for that reason that I came back to Rome. I sleep better here than on Capri."

"And San Michele is vacant?"

"The Constant Wife" will be presented Friday evening. May 15. There are several new players in the cast.

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"Yes," the doctor replied, "but those who wish to see it may do so. Just think, the Americans come by Naples with 'San Michele' in their hands. They come to Capri to see it and me, but they are unable to see me because I keep myself secluded in 'Turris Materla', a tower of the Middle Ages, which I love almost more than San Michele."

"An American lady who I met she had worn out four copies of 'San Michele'. It was like a Bible to her," she said. "I got many moving letters from America and from England. Two thousand have come from America alone, and I have had an equal number from England. And, although the book is not particularly flattering to physicians, I have nevertheless received many letters from colleagues around the world."

"Never become a best seller," concluded Dr. Munthe. "It is almost a damnation! I am followed everywhere by journalists, and America wants me to come over there and speak. The one thing that has made me happy, however, is that in London and America 'The Story of San Michele' is to be issued—in Braille. People have written to me that they think it is the greatest book since the Bible. This has moved me almost to tears—I can read no more."

W. M. Bignon, weather observer at the East Texas State Teachers' College reports Thursday's rainfall at 28 inch, which brings the total April rainfall to 311 inches. The rainfall this month is lower than the April rainfall for the past seven years, which according to records is 4.45 inches.

According to Mr. Bignon, 9.18 inches is the greatest April rainfall recorded in the past seven years and 1.53 inches is the lightest rainfall record.

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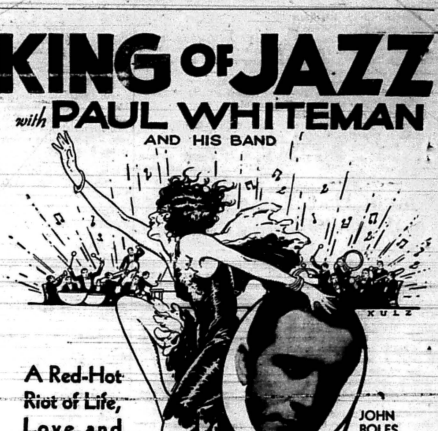
