AN APOLOGY

A letter apologizing to Dr. S. H. Whitley and the students of E. T. S. T. C. for the painting of the Mayo monument was received Monday, October 19, from Wilbur Cunningham, Student President of Wesley College.

The letter is as follows: Greenville, Texas, October 17, 1931. Dr. S. H. Whitley and Students of E. T. S. T. C.:

The students of Wesley College wish to submit their apology for the act of painting the letters on Dr. Mayo's tomb. We agree with you that the whitewashing was carried to extremes although it was meant in a spirit of friendly rivalry. After conversing with some of the participants in the act we discovered that none of them knew that the monument marked the tomb of Dr. Mayo or it would not have been done.

We sincerely hope that our apology will be accepted and that the bonds of friendship between the two colleges will continue to exist as they have in the past. In closing we say that we are indeed sorry that this unfortunate incident has happened.

Weird Settings In 'The Spider'

Idea of Co-Director Memmie Are Carried Out by Wiles in Fox Dramas

Although Gordon Wiles is credited with the art direction of 'The Spider,' Fox mystery drama opening Friday at the Palace Theatre with Edmund Lowe and Lois Moran enacting the leading roles, the strong influence of William Cammer Memmie who, with Kenneth MacKenna, co-directed the picture, is discernible in every scene.

According to Memmie, who is ranked the leader among the newer school of "impressionistic background" art directors, the symbolical settings used in "The Spider" are the most illustrative examples of the new form yet to come out of Hollywood.

This is particularly noticeable in the stage set, the main scene of action in the unique drama which takes place entirely upon

the stage and in the aisles of a modern theatre. The dominating motif, in which Wiles followed closely the ideas of Memmie, carries out a combination of a villain's web and a sewerer's tower, which no more suitable setting for Edmund Lowe's activities as a magician could well be imagined.

Memme is still young enough to be listed in the new order of motion picture workers, but his activity has been gleaned through years of experience and from accepting what the old order had to give. When he did the settings for "The Thief of Bagdad," his first work of outstanding merit, he was then only a few years removed from making labels for red tomato cans to pay his way through a life class at art school. Before that, he had attended Yale.

His advance into a directorial capacity was made possible by Fox Films, who signed him to co-direct "Always Goodbye," with Kenneth MacKenna. The success of action in the unique drama earned for the team the direction

of "The Spider," based on the sensational stage play.

The products of the soil of East Texas if properly distributed will support a population many times as large as that of Texas. No wonder that East Texas have faith in their soil and believe in its conservation.
