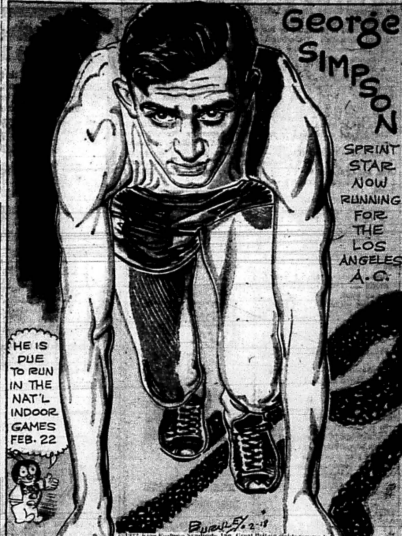

Uncle Sam's Sprinting Ace

GEORGE SIMPSON, the famous "Buckeye Bullet," has been in the news for several weeks made two moves on which he has a better chance than any other man in the world to win the 100-yard dash in the coming Olympic games in Los Angeles. First, he pulled up stakes in his native Columbus, Ohio, and moved to the west of the continent. Second, he decided to run barefoot under the colors of the Los Angeles club, where he will have the benefit of the active coaching of Coach Boyce, whom he will lead the "Red Sox" and has first 100-yard dash in a few days start. Of course, much discussion has

been centered around Simpson's starts. In 1929, after a rest of six months, he turned in a sensational 9.25 seconds hundred, the fastest up to that time. The time was held unofficially by the A. A. U. officials, however, because he had started blocks there would be no "no-holds-barred" his greatest effort went for naught. Coach Boyce convinced him that he can help Simpson to do the hundred just as fast without starting blocks. He expects to train him in the first thirty yards of the race, and enable him to cover the initial stretch with the speed of Frank Johnson. Simpson is considered a faster finisher than the Trojan and with a perfected start may be

able to go out and smash that 9.25 mark. Who knows? At that rate, it is the opinion of judges and spectators that Simpson is the most advanced and most American sprinter. In addition to the "Buckeye Bullet" hoped-for supremacy in the century dash, he is one of the United States' best in the farling. In the absence of the unexpected appearance of a 210-pound dark horse from Simpson looks like a sure thing. And in the relay, with Simpson, Myhoff and Tyne—and another to be picked from the field of veterans and youngsters. Uncle Sam seems well equipped in an Olympic campaign, but any nation been so well equipped with track predators.
