### YOUNG LADIES WHO BEAR

Henry Seidel Canby, editor of the Saturday Review of Literature, summarizes the theories of city-working girls who speak with priggish selection of words, but with a hardness and rasping of voices that is intolerable.

"We think that these young people are representatives of a class which advertises and hollyhoos better shops of language which is the correct use of English."

"The city girls are the graduates of our universities and colleges, our boarding schools and cultural academies. They are not those who have drifted through four years of required arts and sciences curriculum, getting that intellectual education which is the mark of a liberal education."

Canby also desires to spend four years in the fine arts school, the average student gets little emphasis placed on the value of her voice. That is, to quote Canby, "most characteristics of all human attributes is to be the essential person, telling as much of the truth as can be told in a brief context, saying far more than this words."

Such training and emphasis could be required. Such incidents of college graduates could be avoided.—Oklahoma Daily.

Even in our own Southern cities whose citizens are regarded with what some do not know is to have a soft and more pleasing manner of speech, we can agree with Dr. Canby that the thousands of far too many of our girls are dissipated and indulged in "sapping" their vitality.

It is just accounted for by the nervous tension, to which the city workers and city dwellers are naturally subjected in their constant round of pressing duties in the streets and in the office.

That many of these people, as the Oklahoma Daily suggests, may be college trained is doubtless true. But most of their training is in the field of the sciences, and not one of the essential attributes to a successful personality in business as well as in social circles. The relief comes in times in encountering a well-mannered voice among the great majority of dissipated tongues is proof enough of the value of cultured speech.

The voice never derived from listening in general courses to the pleasant voice of a professor trained to the use of the King's English are far too shallow to bear the strain of the business world's hurry and clamor.

It is the voice that is well trained through specific training and long supervised practice will accomplish the downfall of those who live of which Dr. Canby complains.—College Star, San Marcos.

### TWELVE RULES FOR LONGEVITY

4. Don't ignore your limitations.
5. Don't consume any single by overworking, over-eating and over-exercising.
6. Eat a little more each year until you are 30; after 30 eat a little less each year until you are 100.
7. It is safer in the end to be a wisp rather than a samson. It is unwise to be both.
8. Slightly under-eaten, slightly underweight, and slightly better the weaker you continue to longevity.
9. Few people die of starvation, but many slowly take themselves to death.
10. We seldom die of old age; we die of disease or other accidents.
11. Shut the germs of pneumonia. They lie in wait for you.
12. Resist the quick life before premature society forces it upon you.—Houstonian.

### TALKIES TO AID IN SCHOOLS

A plan to use talking motion pictures as teaching equipment in the schools was made by a new educational project recently inaugurated by Robert Maynard Hutchins, executive and modern young president of the University of Chicago. Great events in history will be dramatized in only the first series of 20 films which are planned to be com-

pleted in time for the use of the freshman classes this fall. For several years The University of Texas has had a visual educational Bureau to give silent film and slide service to the high school and colleges of Texas. Many films and slides on history, geography, agriculture, botany, and a great variety of other subjects are sent out every year, and are used by teachers all over the State, not as a substitute for an important and useful addition to the educational scheme.

Mr. Charles Joe Moore, chief of the visual education bureau at the University, expressed the opinion that educational talking motion pictures will be used to great advantage in schools all over the country as soon as machines are able or willing to take a projection machine at a price that school will be able to afford. Mrs. Moore named the teaching of languages as one example of a study in which talking pictures would be a wonderful aid.—Simmons' Texas, Austin.

### LOST LEADERS

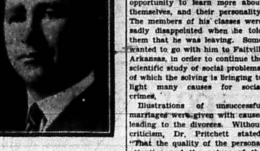
