## Forward or Backward?

It is a serious task that cutting teachers' salaries at the new legislative year. It is not merely a comparatively few engaged in the teaching profession, but to every member of society as well as to the future generations.

It is this to be a land of the free where democracy rules, it must not be a land of the uneducated where ignorance is predominant. If the lowest and the highest members of society are alike alike in its government, their educational advantages must be nearly equal as possible. Our free schools must be adequately supported through the state and the ground it now has gained is still far in the rear of what it should and could attain.

Perhaps our educational fees are too financially weak during the present crisis to answer the command to "CHARGE!" but that they are so weak that they must be compelled to RETREAT! Those who have the means to afford to educate their private tutors which only the minority can afford!

All this arises out of a question of salaries—a question that has to do with money. Then does this mean that teachers and future teachers are so necessary and selfish that they will desert and avoid the field of teaching merely by because of lower salaries? On the contrary, teachers have proved themselves to be extremely altruistic and self-sacrificing by their having served and continuing to serve in the field of education where remuneration is small in comparison to compensation received by persons whose service is less worth while, less responsible, and less exacting positions, not nearly so valuable to society as a whole as that of the teacher's service. If you will stop and consider just how very valuable an efficient teacher's services can be and that the solution of such great national concerns as the prevention of crime and making the world safe for democracy depend on her efforts at character building and educating a future membership of society, you will see that the cost of living has increased in small in comparison to compensation received by persons whose service is less worth while, less responsible, and less exacting positions, not nearly so valuable to society as a whole as that of the teacher's service. I have mentioned Harvard, so begin with the Harvard class of 1941 which had about 600 members. Three men in 1914, who were well acquainted with this class, picked out independently its "successful" members. They were supposed to pick out examples not of luck, but of merited success. It happened that 23 members of the class were named by all three of the "pickers" as successful. On looking up the marks of the 23 who had Harvard, we found that 10 of our marks were A's, 11 in B's, 2 in C's, and 0 in D's. President Lowell found only one A's in the 100 in Harvard College and who followed up by doing fine work in either the Harvard Law or Medical School. Slightly 50% of those who graduate in the top fourth of the High School stay in the upper half in college, while 80% of those who graduate in the bottom fourth of the High School make almost a complete failure in college.
