Five members of the East Texas Press Association are in Alpine this week attending the twenty-sixth annual meeting of the Texas Intercollegiate Press Association being held at Sul Ross State Teachers College.

Those present are Edward Mangum, president of the local organization and editor-in-chief of the East Texas, Alvin Bray, vice-president of the press club secretary of the East Texas, Jack Hickerson, editor-in-chief of the 1936 Local, and Mrs. J. M. Galt, secretary of the district.

The five delegates left early Wednesday morning with Dr. J. Gentry, president of the Graduate Division of T. P. A. and president of the East Texas Press Association. They arrived in Alpine at midnight and left the following afternoon, and will return Monday or Tuesday of next week.

Among the outstanding features of the program, which began last night and lasts through tomorrow night, are speeches by the editor of the 1936 Local, Alvin Bray, and the president of the Texas Intercollegiate Press Association, concluded by the conference on Thursday.

The East Texas delegation will make a determined effort to bring next year's annual meeting of T. P. A. to this county, presenting a tentative program which includes outstanding speakers of note in the newspaper world. They also hope to bring back several prizes for the county on the last day.

Coach "Bud" Perry's 11th annual track and field meet for the co-eds of Stephen F. Austin and the Sam Houston State University is a triangular meet to be unveiled on the local oval in an afternoon. This is the sole opportunity for the college and track fans of the future to see the local action as this is the only home met carried for the varsity.

The varsity has participated in two previous intercollegiate meets as well as in the Texas Relays, Border Olympics, and the Worth Park Stock Show meets. They have lost to the southwest State University in one of the intercollegiate meets and have dominated the Texas Relays and Worth Park triangular meet at Huntville in the past.

Lions Take Tri Meet From Kats Lumberjacks Friday

Collecting 82 points, the East Texas Lions took top honors in a triangular meet with the Stephen F. Austin and Sam Houston Teachers Colleges Friday afternoon in Huntville. The Nacoches thirty-clad topped runner-up barrels with 5 1/2 points while the Houston Bearcats trailed with 33 1/2 markers.

Warren of Stephen F. Austin was the outstanding performer of the day. The long, lanky lumberjack took first place in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and the broad jump. The track was slow and times were not very impressive. The most notable performance was the 527 seconds quarter-mile hurdlers in by Kierker of the Lions. Stewart, Taylor, Lowrey, and Kierker showed the best time of any quartet entered in a meet this season by Coach Berry.
