The question is, built we true our students are the convenience of the convenie To provide for this, why not make the qualifica-tion one of classification rather than scholarship? Give all students of Junior classification or above the privilege and freedom of non-compulsory classes so long as their standing remains unimpaired. As has been pointed out before, this will not only free him for the most profitable activity, if that is necessary, but it will mean that profes-

If that is necessary, but it will mean that professor will give him more for which to come to class.

Let us join with Texas State College for Women at Denton in being one of the first to introduce this improvement of higher education in Texas. Add this to our new graduate work, and we can say that East Texas State has truly become of


