Southwest Seeking Places On All-Star Eleven

Commerce Included In 176 All-Star Football Polling Places In Nation

Dallas Contest To Show Stars Against Bears

REPUBLIC TO CHOOSE STARTING LINE-UP FOR TILT AT CHICAGO; HIGHEST RANKING TEXANS TEND TO PERFORM AT DALLAS.

With polls open under the auspices of 176 newspapers in almost every state in the union and voting started, the team of 22 college seniors who are to oppose the world's professional champions, the Detroit Lions, in Chicago on Sept. 1 and the Chicago Bears, in Dallas on Sept. 7, is in the process of formation.

For the first time the football fans who select the starting line-up also name the starting lineup for the game. The 11 players who receive the highest number of votes will be on the field for the tilt unless their physical condition prevents.

Voting in Chicago and Texas are being sponsored by The Daily Journal in cooperation with the Chicago Tribune, original sponsor of the game. Fans of the Southwest are expected to show an augmented interest in the poll because of the fact which has been arranged for the Cotton Bowl in Dallas a week after the Chicago tilt.

The Southwest team to oppose the Bears will be selected from the 176 newspapers of the nation who receive the highest number of votes in the poll being conducted now. The players of the Southwest Conference will rank high in the standings of the poll as indicated by the fact that 21 Texas papers are assisting in conducting the nationwide voting.

It is this in the fact that this state exhibited a stellar array of football greats last season that has caused the greatest participation in the poll. Of the 22 of the best professional football players, Bobby Wilson, Jimmie Shroyer, Tommie Ford, J. C. Wheeler, Al S. M. Lawrence, Darrell H. Hubbs, Sam Greenlee and Jarring Jim Lawson, T. C. U. Sims, Bill Winters and John W. Rice's touchdown totals, are all sure to be well up in national voting.

The halting in the players' poll will continue for two weeks. Only men who have completed their college eligibility will be eligible to play in the all-star game. As soon as the players poll is completed the fans will be requested to name a staff of four coaches to direct the college squad.

Interest in the vote has been shown with only 23 newspapers participating, nearly a million votes were cast. Last season more than eight million ballots were cast. Cause is expected this year. Last year's governors' state address their constituents in behalf of favorite candidates. Tommie Ford of Alabama, who won the coaches poll last year received 130,000 votes in his own state that President Roosevelt received there in 1932.
