**"For When One Great Scorer"**

"Shades of Robert E. Lee" and "The Old LSC—she ain't what she used to be"—such were the cries arising from four Lone Star Conference schools Monday morning when they awoke to find the other four members, North Texas State, Trinity, Houston U. and Hardin, had tired of their playmates and moved to another backyard. Foundations for this succession were laid at the December meeting of LSC officials. This parley was slipping drowsily along when Trinity representatives proposed three rule changes that raised more howls than a wildcat with his tail caught in a washing machine ringer. The San Antonio school, which hasn't been able to win even a tiddle-de-winks joust in the LSC, apparently decided things couldn't be any worse and suggested that:

- (1) Each LSC member place a \$5000 minimum gate on each football game,
- (2) Restrictions governing athletic scholarships be lifted and
- (3) member schools be compelled to play a minimum of only five conference grid games.

The ensuing vote found North Texas State, Houston U. and newly-elected Hardin College climbing on the Trinity bandwagon with a whoop. The East Texas, Stephen F. Austin, Sam Houston and Southwest Texas bloc killed the motion, however, and everyone went home sadder and not much wiser.

**Lions To Face SWT  
And TU on Road Trip**

Coach Darrell Tulley's East Texas cagers, fighting to stay in the LSC race, left Thursday for an invasion of the Southern end of the loop. Friday night the Lions meet cello-dwelling Trinity in San Antonio, moving on to San Marcus Saturday for tilt with Southwest Texas. Tulley's quietest rates an easy nod over the Trinity five who have yet to crack the conference win column. The Lions will face a real test in San Marcus, however, and the game could easily develop into a carbon copy of the thriller East Texas and Southwest Texas staged in Commerce early in the race. The Lions squeaked past the Bobcats in this contest 61-59.

One loss on this trip would not completely eliminate the Lions from the championship but it would definitely make their title chances slim. Stephen F. Austin continues to pace the conference. The Lumberjacks, tutored by Glenn Rose, formerly of Arkansas, evidently boast the best cage team in their history. The University of Houston is in the number two slot with one loss, East Texas ranks third, with the remaining rundown Southwest Texas, North Texas Sam Houston and Trinity, in that order. Two of the Lion hoopers,

we must ponder over the rumor that Texas Tech, Hardin-Simmons and Oklahoma City University have been invited to join the new conference, thereby adding much needed prestige thereby raising attendance, etc. Again all this is rumor but highly logical. Of the three Hardin-Simmons seems the only prospective catch for the new loop. The attitude of the Abilene school to such a proposal is not known. They would undoubtedly be interested in stepping out of the Border Conference if their position could be bettered by the move. Whether or not they regard this "baby" organization as an improvement over the Border loop is debatable.

Their chances of admission seems to improve each year and a majority of the Southwest Conference schools are now in favor. That Tech would join a new loop and endanger these chances in any way seems about as likely as the Republicans nominating Truman for president in 1952. Oklahoma City University stands in the same position as Tech, except the clique they are trying to break into the Missouri Valley Conference. That this new loop can

woo them away from this campaign isn't feasible. At least one school that is mentioned for admission to the new circuit and that will undoubtedly be glad to join is Corpus Christi University (it's in Corpus Christi, Texas for the benefit of those not owning an almanac). Corpus Christi, which joined the senior college ranks last year, will always have a tender spot reserved in the heart of Trinity since the Tigers actually defeated them last season.

Whether the new circuit will achieve its desired goals or not is for history to decide but at least it has the population factor working on its side. From the statement made Saturday by L. B. Ligon of Hardin College, the loop's new prey, success will not be determined on the basis of athletic attendance or prestige. In reporting the new organization he said the word "Athletics" was purposely omitted because such would preclude other extra-curricular activities from conference competition. From this we must conclude that the real reason for the new organization is to foster competition in typewriting, poetry reading and forensics. Such events as football, basketball and track are incidental. Another promising theory—but who believes it?
