China, our ally, with her six million fighting men, her indomitable spirit, her vast resources, her strategic position. and her great desire to help herself and fer friends, is a fighting bulwark against the tyranny that seeks to enslave us all. China needs us-we need China, so let us give substantial aid to those brave men and women whose struggle in this war is linked with our own destiny.

Three Rabbits which successfully captures the characteristic timidity and meekness of rabbits, and the superb Chinese Children at Play. From the British Museum collection there are copies of Higer, Portrait of a Gentleman, and the sensitive color print, Maid Bringing a Candle to Her Mistress.

Chinese art is purely design with brush strokes as the elemental means of expression. Each stroke has its own character r and vitality, however there is a sense of structure and movement in the figures; a great deal of expression in the hands and faces; and rythmic sweep of sure, unfaltering line. All is expressed by line, with new shading, no expression of lepth in earlier paintings. The technique has strongly influthe figures and landscapes being painted on specially prepared silk or paper, and when once the stroke of the brush had touched the surface, it could not be altered. This demanded of the painter not only perfect control in handling the brush, but also a careful thinking out of his work before he applied the ink.

We must keep in mind to appreciate Chinese painting we must understand that it has no analogy with our painting; rather it is akin to our music. The main difference in Chinese painting and ours rests on the basis that the Chinese handle painting ,not as we handle painting, but as we handle music, for the purpose of lending color to and evoking the whole range of sentiments and emotions of humanity.
