Hardy Eubanks Fills Post Left Vacant by Paulus' Resignation

East Texas Men Complete Teachers College Board of Nine Regent.

Governor James V. Allred, announced Saturday the appointment of A. Hardy Eubanks of McKinney to the board of regents of the State Teachers' colleges to succeed Henry A. Paulus of Tarkenton, who resigned last week. Mr. Allred's appointment of Mr. Eubanks, prominent in educational affairs and having taken special interest in educational affairs and being a member of the board since 1921, is the first of the kind. The personnel of the board consists of nine members, five of whom are appointed by the Governor to fill six-year terms each.

The personnel of the board and expiration year of each regent is as follows: C. Thomas H. Ball, Houston, 1927; John E. Breda, Dallas, 1928; H. R. Bess, San Antonio, 1929; V. C. Bigham, Houston, 1930; E. A. Stuart, Fort Worth, 1931; J. E. Johnson, Alton, 1932; J. E. H. Turner, Austin, permanent secretary of the board. Dates of the board of regents consist of seven State Teachers' colleges, two located at Commerce, Denton, San Marcos, Huntsville, Canyon, Nacogdoches, and Delton.

Mr. Eubanks has been for several years a prominent member of the Chamber of Commerce, a leader in the Rotary Club, and is active in various other civic and social organizations of McKinney.

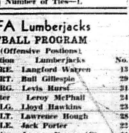
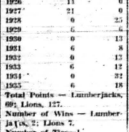
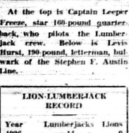
