## Sam Rayburn, '03, Becomes Democratic Floor Leader In House of Representatives

Representative Sam Rayburn of Houston, a graduate of the East Texas College, and now in the New Deal, administration, announced today that he had been elected floor leader for the House of Representatives.

Rayburn, a Democrat, was elected Monday by the House of Representatives at 7 o'clock on Friday, December 31, 1936. He defeated the incumbent, Charles McNary of Oregon, by a vote of 317 to 179.

He has been a Congressman continuously since 1913, at which time he represented the 13th district of the Texas House of Representatives. He has served six terms in the Texas Legislature, and served one term in the United States House of Representatives.

Four years before his entrance into the United States House of Representatives, he was elected to the Texas State Legislature in 1911.
