Alumni In The Legislature

East Texas State is not without its prominent alumni who return to come to the cradling of the 45th session of the state legislature. An investigation shows that some ex-students are serving the state in some capacity, and nearly all of the number are among the law makers themselves.

Louis Landford, fifty-seven year old representative from this district, and a resident of Commerce, is the oldest legislator to call East Texas State his alma mater.

A school teacher himself for twenty-one years, Mr. Landford was elected to the House of Representatives in the previous year.

Aide from his regular representative position, Landford will serve on the Education, Privilege, Suffrage, and Elections, Constitutional Amendments, and Public Printing committees.

Charles H. Tenney, thirty-four, is another East Texas alumnus who is at Austin serving in the legislature. Tenney is a graduate of East Texas State and was one of the campus leaders while enrolled as a student here.

Now serving in his third session of the legislature, Mr. Tenney taught school for a number of years before being elected to the House of Representatives.

Starting a half-minute rally, Stephen F. Austin State Teachers from Nacogdoches, beat over the San Marcos Lions 32-31 in what was the hottest battle to be yet played in this year's Loop Conference Loop.

Trailing the 12-0, East Texas started the ball late in the Lumbereks guard house, only to be forced and white boys from possession.
