## Studes Could Circle Globe 4 Times; But Attend Exetex Instead

Statistics from the Dean of Women's office show that only five of East Texas State's 1,800 women students could look and forth from a distance of sixty miles or more. ### Summer Foods Need Special Care In Handling

AUSTIN, Texas, July 25.—Recent outbreaks of food poisoning have been striking the home for special care in handling and preparing summer foods.

Prevention of food poisoning requires clean food handled as little as possible and consumed while it is fresh.

"Most food poisoning is caused by infection by certain types of bacteria which grow rapidly in high temperature and high humidity. The infection may come from the hands, streams, flies, rodents, contaminated water, or in fresh food materials and insects, all of which are rapidly and easily contaminated with filthy conditions."

"Pork, food transmitting food poisoning to the members of the household is the most dangerous. Sound, fresh, foods, clean, free from stagnant odors, slimy, etc., are essential for the food.

It is important to avoid excessive hand contacts with the food. See that clean containers are used and that special care is exercised in wrapping foods to protect them from dust.

"If food that is prepared must be advanced at room temperature, keep it refrigerated and thoroughly chilled at 60 degrees Fahrenheit until fifty degrees.

"Dishes which are not to be eaten at an outing. Season foods excessive heat, and its use should be avoided. Wash hands and use soap and water before and after handling food.
