GLAMOROUS OPERA PRIMA DONNA RETURNS TO LONE STAR STATE TO SING IN DENTON PREMIERE

DENTON, Feb. 6.—Glamorous Leonora Corona, whose face and figure are one pleasant bit of testimony that an opera star may photograph well and still reach the top in the musical world, will come to Texas this week for final rehearsals of Julia Smith's opera, "Cynthia Parker," in which she sings the title role for its premiere performance on Feb. 16-17 at Denton.

Known as one of the most strikingly beautiful singers of her day, Corona has had a varied and successful career. At 14 she was a concert pianist in Dallas, but soon turned to singing. While in her teens she is said to have been offered \$1,000 a week by the old Keith-Caplan circuit to tour in vaudeville, but she chose to follow a operatic career.

Tulane Starts Drive For Mayan Pyramid

NEW ORLEANS, La., Feb. 6.—Tulane university's Middle American Research Institute has initiated a nationwide campaign for \$100,000 to finance the construction in New Orleans of a new museum building and the endowment of a program of international cultivation between Middle America and the United States, according to announcement today by Dr. Rufus C. Harris, president of the University.

The proposed reappreciation program is significant in that the future prosperity of the country depends to a great extent on the cooperation between the United States and Middle America—comprising Mexico, the Central American republics and the West Indies," Dr. Harris commented.

In addition to constructing the great pyramid-museum building, Dr. Harris explained, the Institute is laying plans to inaugurate a program of educational exchange between the United States and the Caribbean region closer together.
