For the "cons," the University of Michigan Daily says: "To weaken President is far more the aim of the sponsors than any philanthropic extension of the democratic process.... There is no guarantee that a vote of the people would insure a sane and cool-headed consideration of war."

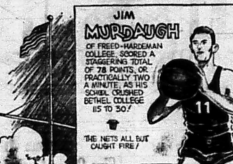

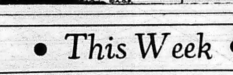

Triangular Meets With Denton and Howard Payne

Eleven Fistic Bouts are Billed by Promoter Hudek on Tonight's Fite Program

Berrymen Undefeated Since 1936 In Dual and Triangular Meets

Friday night at Brownwood with Berrymen's Lion team to win a triangular meet against two of the strongest college organizations in Texas when they defeated the Howard Payne blue-jackets, who took second with 58.66, and the North Texas as Eagles, who came last with 45.33. The victory leaves the Lions undefeated in dual and triangular meets since 1936, which is one of the best college fistic records in the United States. Hunt of the Lions closed the bar at 6 feet 4 inches to win the high jump and then jumped 22 feet, one-half inch to win the broad jump. Hodge of Ebers won the shot put. Tully won the javelin, and Krewetz the 220 yard low hurdles.

and arithmetic. Tuition was free but there were only three young women present on the opening day to take the examination. Dr. Whitley said:

Teachers colleges have developed rapidly and largely because of what happened in Massachusetts in 1830. Today there are

179 teachers colleges, and 60 normal schools devoted entirely to the training of teachers in the United States. Seven of these colleges are in Texas.

"The teachers colleges of the south have not been slow in improving their standards of work. They now belong to the educational rating agencies of the United States and their work has been approved so that their graduates may enroll without penalty in the best graduate college and universities of the nation," Dr. Whitley asserted.

Teachers colleges were first admitted to membership in the Southern Association in 1902. In that year five teachers colleges from Texas were allowed to join.

"Another phase of progress in the teachers colleges of the south began in 1920, when a college in North Carolina, began offering work leading to the master's degree."

Graduates of the teachers colleges are employed in every state of the nation and many of them hold high and responsible

positions not only in education, but also in the councils of the nation. No superior claims are here offered for the services of these colleges. They are not one of all the credits for progress in education, but their contributions are noteworthy and are no doubt appreciated by the general public." Dr. Whitley stated in closing.

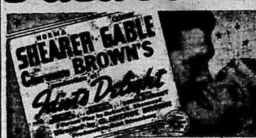
