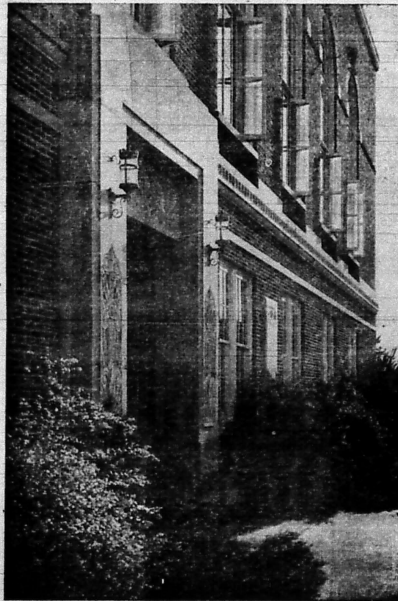

The following letter is from a former librarian of East Texas State Teachers College, who is at present connected with the State Board of Insurance Commissioners in El Paso, Texas.

El Paso, Texas
March 27, 1933

Dear Miss Williams:

This is a reply to your request for an article or letter that at some time of the college library year I served as librarian.

At that time the library was located in the southwest room on the first floor of the Main Building. It was more of a treat-book depository than a reference library.

Practically all of the reference books had belonged to the East Texas Normal College. Many were old, a number were first editions, and quite a few were autographed copies given to the late Dr. W. L. Mayo. The books would have been a joy to a collector.

Near the close of the year the library in the Industrial Hall was completed and the books removed to larger quarters.

The personnel of the library force included Miss Louie Patten, Lulu Houston, Howard Salomon, and George S. Johnson. Miss Patten is now teaching art in New York University. Miss Houston, Mrs. Rita of Dallas, Mr. Salomon is a lumber company representative in Wichita Falls.

At that time was a wholesome group of young people. Many are outstanding citizens, and some are holding positions of honor and trust today.

The following letter is from M. J. Mayo, brother of W. L. Mayo. The former is a professor in Harris Teachers College, St. Louis, Mo.

March 31, 1933

Dear Miss Williams:

Since receiving your kindly letter of the eight instant, my thoughts have reverted many times to the beginnings of your library. I wish sincerely that I might render the favor requested; but I fear my recollections are now too vague and lacking in detail to make presentation of them worth while.

I do remember well the spirit and the sacrifice back of those beginnings. The first books that went into the library were the small personal collection of the founder of the College—books that he had read and reread, many of them having been carried across the country from Kentucky to Texas. Students Fortunate To Be Provided With Textbooks

The East Texas State Teachers College has made it possible for its students to have access to necessary and many supplementary textbooks at a very small expense to the student. This program of providing education good enough for the student and cheap enough for the parent, the large expense of buying many textbooks required by the pre-reading and college curriculum has been almost eliminated.

At the beginning of every semester each student pays a small fee, and the proceeds therefrom are used in the purchase of textbooks required by the various courses and subjects of the college curriculum. This fee is small, indeed, when it is compared with the initial cost of the textbooks that students are required to use. It amounts to approximately five per cent of the fee paid by the students and is less than two dollars per semester for each student.

The number of textbooks used to students each semester range from five to more than twenty per student. For the current semester approximately 100,000 textbooks have been issued to students extending over the entire semester. This is used by students doing extra work. The cost of these books range from one cent to five dollars each, and is very evident when the plan of furnishing textbooks to students is compared with the average program of education.
