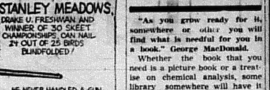

Government Documents Valuable for Research

A fairly complete history of the New Deal could be written from the government documents which now pour into the library at an average rate of twenty-five a day. There are, for instance, the many publications of the alphabet agencies, which tell of the work of the CCC, the FHL, the AAA, the REA, the RRA, the RFC, and many others. The publications of Congress, vast quantities of bills, acts, resolutions, slip laws, and treaties, all tell their story. The shelves contain the regular publications of the ten departments under the ten cabinet officers, whose output is so varied that the various sources become a forest to enter. There are, for instance, may turn to bulletin papers out by the Children's Bureau of the Labor Department to find how to rear the baby, or he may consult the Patent Bulletin, published by the Department of Agriculture, to discover the best way to prepare his eggs for market.

There are also bulletins, leaflets, pamphlets, books, and news pamphlets, book and periodicals, the last, underlying things they use to be the trend is toward increased attractiveness and readability. An increasing number are now printed on quality white paper, in large print, and with a profusion of letters.
