## Stone Lion Majestically Protrays Spirit of Etex

### WORKING HIS WAY THROUGH COLLEGE

All around students, especially those who worked their way through college, have a better chance of getting a job after graduation than the campus hero or the college "prince" according to King Merritt, vice president of Investors Syndicate, of Minneapolis.

Athletes and beauties, unlike a few years ago, are not being sought merely as sex objects for their prospective employers some substantial qualities, such as character, scholarship, adaptability, leadership or personality, a survey of 156 American colleges and universities reveals.

Although the job outlook for college graduates is brighter than in either 1938 or 1937, American employers are more exacting in their requirements, preferring employees capable of being developed into executives within the next decade over those who seem to have decided limitations.

"Character as a prime qualification for a job," explained Mr. Merritt in reporting on total replies, "was mentioned by 103 schools, scholarship by 29, personality by 18, adaptability by 12 and leadership by 11. As for the qualifications put scholarship first with 60 mentions. Ten followed adaptability with 36, character with 33, and personality with 19 mentions. A third qualification group gave adaptability 49 mentions and scholarship 45 mentions. Twenty-three mentions of campus popularity put it at the head of the fourth qualification group. Athletic prowess headed the fifth group with 23 mentions.

"Emphasis on character, which college placement officers tell us is a recent trend, is reflected in replies from 129 co-educational institutions who cited two to eight or more qualities now being sought by American employers. Qualities mentioned and their percentage of total mention in this group follow: character 90.7 per cent, adaptability 49.3 per cent, scholarship 44.3 per cent, personality 38.1 per cent, athletic prowess 22.5 per cent, leadership 17.8 per cent, and extra-curricular activities, which includes outside jobs to pay one's way through college, 14 per cent.

"The student who works his way or her way through college," continued Mr. Merritt, "not only earns his or her educational expenses in whole or part but can be counted on to solve difficulties after graduation, several officials emphasized. One typical reply to the query on what qualifications were being stressed more follows:

"Adaptability, co-operativeness, compatibility, and the ability to work harmoniously with others are being stressed more, especially by large organizations, who emphasize team play even in research."

East Texas Students should seriously consider the facts presented here.

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## Librarian Discovers Penal Code

Somewhere in the East Texas Library, forgotten by the students but not by the librarians, is a copy of the Penal Code of the State of Texas. For the information of the students, who possibly have been violating the law, a number of the library staff "found" the code for the students and three articles from it are reprinted below. Seniors especially would profit much by cutting this article out and saving it for future reference in your studies.

**Penal Code of the State of Texas.**  
Article 1366. Injuring or defacing library property.—Whoever willfully injures or defaces any book, newspaper, magazine, pamphlet, manuscript, reading room, museum, or other educational institution, by writing, marking, tearing, breaking, or mutilating shall be fined not less than ten nor more than twenty-five dollars.

**Article 1367. Detaining books.**  
Whoever willfully obtains any book, newspaper, magazine, pamphlet, manuscript, or other educational institution, by writing, marking, tearing, breaking, or mutilating shall be fined not less than ten nor more than twenty-five dollars.

Finals in both singles and doubles are scheduled for Saturday afternoon.

East Texas Mathematics Department is making plans to enter a strong team into the competition of the two big mathematics contests next year. One is the William Lowell Putnam Mathematical Competition and the other is the Southern States Mathematics Association.

Heading a large mathematics department, such as the one at the University of Texas at Austin, will offer a wide variety of contests with several new ones being offered next term.
