\$175,000 Has Been Recommended By State Board of Control

President Whitley to Be in Austin to Look After The Regular Biennial Appropriation.

The Fort-first Legislature convened in Austin on January eighth. The Senate completed its organization the first day. Lieutenant Governor Barry Miller is the presiding officer and it was not necessary therefore, for the Senate to elect a presiding officer. The Lieutenant

Governor is by virtue of his position, the presiding officer of the Senate. Not only did the Senate organize the first day, but the Chairman also had to come before the Legislature.

CONWAY GIVEN IMPORTANT PLACES

Austin, Jan. 14.—Hunt County's two members in the legislative council exceptionally well in receiving important committee appointments in the list of appointments announced Monday by Speaker W. E. Barrow. V. E. Conway of Commerce was made chairman of the committee on state eleemosynary and reformatory institutions and received appointment on the other following committee:
