It would be well for those who have not the courtesy to refrain from laughing at something of serious nature, when such courtesy is an obligation, to practice a little self control and to recall to mind a little of their "manners."

The quality of the student body of the East Texas State Teachers College is worthy. Let's not be forgetful of the resultant obligation we owe to ourselves and to Alma Mater.

VOICE CULTURE RULES BY MISTON TEACHER

Morton Minsky, teacher of voice High School of Practical Arts, Boston, gives a few valuable suggestions on the improvement of the speaking voice. She says in part:
1. Form the habit of listening to the tones in the speaking voice of others; try to imitate the pure, full ones and to avoid the harsh and flattened ones.
2. Fix attention on the auditory memory of your speech for a few seconds after you have finished; judge your own tones by musical standards; a faulty tone detected is half corrected.
3. Vowels are resonators of our voices, sounds of our voice, therefore, give each audible vowel its due value in time and fullness of tone.
4. To overcome the "leakage" voice, make your tones voice your pleasant feelings as readily as they do your irritation; make your words of praise as hearty as your words of blame. You will gradually find your sharp inflections becoming rounded, and your cold tones warm with human feeling.

SCHMIDT WILL ACCEPT OPEN JOB AT T. C. U.

FOUR WORTH, Feb. 12.—T. C. U. athletic officials announced today that Frank Schmidt, a graduate coach at the University of Arkansas, has accepted the position of head coach here. Schmidt is an Austin now with his basketball club to engage the Rizer five in the series that will decide the conference championship.

Schmidt is one of the greatest basketball coaches ever to appear in the conference, and his football teams have always been considered among the most dangerous clubs in the loop. He fills the place left vacant by the resignation of Matt, who will take Bible's place at A. & M. when the latter goes to Nebraska.

It is not known who will be picked to take Schmidt's place at Arkansas. When questioned as to whether he has accepted, the head coaching position at T. C. U., Coach Francis A. Schmidt, head coach of the University at Arkansas, said that he did not desire to say anything at present, but would have plenty to say Saturday. Sports Editor Fort Worth reported stated that Schmidt had accepted the position.

Schmidt said, "I prefer to say nothing about it right now, I probably have something to say about it tomorrow. Nothing should have been said about this matter until it was definitely closed."—Daily Texan.

NEWSPAPERS OF EARLY ENGLAND AND AMERICA IN UNIVERSITY DISPLAY

Early English and American newspapers, including some of the rarest copies of periodicals, are on display at the University of Texas library for the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the Texas Press Association, to be held in Austin February 8 and 9. The exhibition will serve to acquaint the newspaper men with the facilities found at the University for research in the various periods of journalism. The University owns the second best collection of newspapers of the Seventeenth and Eighteenth century papers, surpassed only by the collection at Yale University, while its early Southern and Texas newspapers, as well as its contemporary collection, have earned much favorable comment.—Daily Texan.

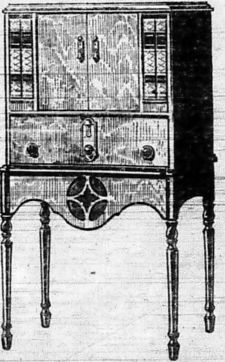

OUTLINES TENDENCIES IN TEACHER TRAINING

The most significant advance in past years, according to President George Willard Frasier of the College of Teacher Training in the Federal House of Representatives in the February Journal of the National Educational Association, has been the accrediting of teacher training institutions by the American Association of Teachers Colleges, a department of the National Educational Association. President Frasier's statement is a review of teacher training activities in 1928.

"The attempt to set definite standards for teachers' colleges is proving an excellent means of bringing these schools to a higher level of educational efficiency," says Mr. Frasier.

"In the training school field," the report continues, "the tendency at present is to increase the amount of student teaching where this type of work is being done. There is a question in the minds of many educators as to the value of student teaching, but in the whole where it is required, the tendency is to have the student teach for several consecutive hours instead of a few minutes each day.

"Another noticeable tendency is the attempt to put student teaching into public school conditions. It is felt that students get more training by teaching under public school conditions than they get under the artificial conditions of the training school. The National Association of Supervisors of Student Teaching, which deals actively with the problem of student teachers in the training school, has become a department of the National Educational Association and is beginning to make itself felt in this field. Three institutions are providing training for teachers who plan to go into the field of supervision of student teaching.

E. T. STUDENT WORKS FOR SCHOLARSHIP IN AERONAUTICS

W. W. Howard, a student of the East Texas State Teachers College, is attempting to win a 4-year university scholarship in aeronautics or Eaglerock airplane, offered this spring by the Alexander Aircraft Company to the American undergraduate who reveals the deepest insight and practical imagination in aeronautics.

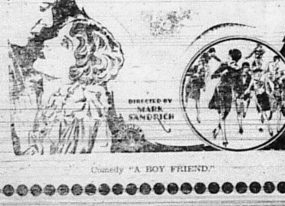

WIFE OF FORMER SPANISH TEACHER TELLS OF LIFE IN CUBA

Below are extracts from a letter to Mrs. H. D. Phillips from Mrs. T. C. Crenshaw. Mrs. Crenshaw is a member of the Spanish Department last summer. They are now living in Cuba.

"This part of Cuba, which is only a few hours ride out of Santiago is the most beautiful I have ever seen and yet it is wonderful. Just now we are living in the country. Pre-Registration for Spring Term 1929.

All students now registered in the college will be expected to make out their schedules for the Spring term before the students to register for the Spring term beginning February 11th, and ending February 23rd. Students will be expected to get a copy of the schedule book from the Registrar's office, for for their own use and one for the use of the office. Students are requested not to get more than two cards, and it is suggested that they do not get them until they are ready to purchase them. There is a great waste of these cards and printed schedules due to carelessness. Students are urged to attend to these promptly. Students will be expected to OK the student's work that will be under his supervision. The Registrar's office will be open from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. on the same line with the subjects under the head of members. After students have completed scheduling, one schedule card will be returned to the Registrar's office. Students will be expected to register for the beginning of the Spring term these three students will report to the Secretary's office to pay their fees.

Students will be expected to register for the next course at the same hour and with the same teacher, if possible. This will enable the office to keep the sections level and eliminate the necessity of having to change the Registrar's Office.
