Since the Texan is generally known as the "student publication of the East Texas State Teachers College," it is quite natural that the students of that institution should offer their cooperation in this attempt of the staff to produce a newspaper to compete with other college publications in its class and to please the readers thereof. Quite often, students are discouraged in their reporting such news because the stories published resemble those submitted by them only in facts; that is, the articles have been re-written. Although the editor does not set himself up as a genius, never having won acceptance in the American Mercury or any other such publications, even the Texan must have certain established journalistic rules.

Still there is another type of material that may be submitted. That is original material, usually verse. The 'Chips' column of the Texan is composed each week of a group of original poems of students of the college, and is the only column of its kind among the foremost college newspapers of the state. Contributions to this department are heartily welcomed, and will be published if they merit such; however, they must be without certain established rules before their admittance thereto.

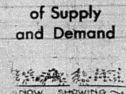

Miss Beatrice Coney, graduate of the College in 1928, is doing dietitian work in the Philadelphia General Hospital this summer.

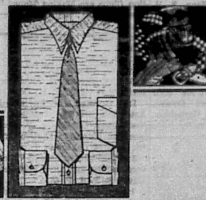
