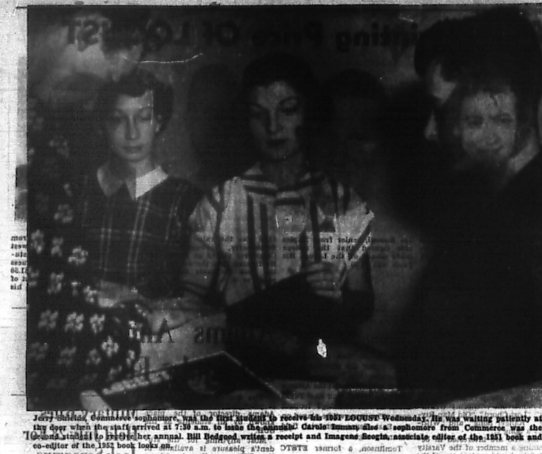

ROTC Enrollment May Reach 600

With two cadets expected to enroll each hall the 21st Air Force ROTC unit at East Texas State will rank among the largest in the 14th Air Force area.

Last summer, the unit ranked fourth in the basic course, 150 in number of students enrolled.

Lt. Colonel Gordon Pacion commands the unit which includes 14 Air Force faculty members. The fall staff will include seven officers and seven sergeants. In addition to courses in Ad-
