East Texas State student personnel staff has announced a series of study sessions beginning Monday December 3. The sessions, totaling three clock-hours might be thought of as a course entitled "Effective Study Habits," and are open to all students. "Attendance is voluntary, but it is hoped that as many students as possible will take advantage of the course," says Earl Koile, director of student personnel.

It is given as a service to assist students in improving their study methods. Koile pointed out that results of previous study sessions of this nature indicated that many students have profited by following the procedures which will be discussed.

The scope of the assistance rendered in the course includes proven methods of planning for study activity, improving environmental and physiological conditions for study, psychological preparation for study, suggested procedures for preparing assignments, taking class notes, preparing term papers, and re-viewing.

There will be 5 sessions, stated Koile, and a student may attend any session, but it is hoped that he will finish all 5 sessions.

"Effective Study Habits" course will be offered 3B in room E-126, on Tuesday, December 4; Thursday, December 6; and Saturday, December 8. It will also be offered at 8th period in room E-118 on Monday, December 3; Wednesday, December 5; and Friday, December 7; 1:30-2:30 in room E-126 on Tuesday, Dec. 4 and Thursday, Dec. 6.

Students who wish to attend but cannot because of conflict in schedule may make arrangements for additional, or individual sessions.

Chester Channon, organist, and Miss Louise Turner, pianist, will provide accompaniment.


The "Hallelujah Chorus" will feature the entire chorus, brass ensemble and soloists.

Former Student Wins Fashion Contest

From the campus of East Texas State to the pages of Glamour magazine as a winner in a fashion contest has been the unusual achievement of Betty Sanford, a former student and resident of Greenville.

This girl of the intrepid spirit has overcome obstacles that to a person of a less determined nature, would have seemed insurmountable. To her they were merely challenges.

Polio dealt her a paralyzing blow when she was a child, but even that didn't stop her. Her spine was damaged, it's true, but her courage was undaunted.

Friends at E.T. remember with what difficulty she walked. Heavy braces were used to help strengthen her back, and supported by canes she managed to walk slowly, very slowly and deliberately.

She became an instructor in the Air Corps teaching young French fliers who were sent to this country the intricacies of instrument flying. It has been said that Miss Sanford was one of the very few girls who how to change a tire on a B-26. After being an interpreter for the Free French Legation during World War II, she was left with new

fields to conquer when it was over.

Dallas knew her for a time as one of its art teachers in the schools, as an assistant art director in an advertising agency, and as publicity director for Dallas Fashion Institute.

Hospitals were accepted by this very unusual girl as a matter of course, for there was always that eventually one would be the place of recovery from her foe. That had slowed her down, even though it hadn't stopped her. Finally she went to New York for special medical treatment, and stayed to take a magazine job.

Lone Star Conference

Catfish Sets Coaching Record

In his first season as head football coach at East Texas State, Catfish Smith not only has led the Lions to the Lone Star conference title, but has also set a record by being the first former LSC player to coach an LSC team to the title.

Catfish, whose name actually is Milburn, starred for the Lions in football and basketball in 1929 and 1934, when the Lions won the Lone Star conference football title. He was chosen all-conference and all-conference forward in basketball. The Lions in those days were directed by Doug Rollins, East Texas State's dean of men and current president of the Lone Star Conference.

High School Posts

After being graduated from E. T. S. T., Catfish coached at Carver and Borger high schools. In 1943 he went to Mt. Vernon to take over leadership of both football and basketball teams. While heading the two sports at the East Texas high school, Smith established himself as one of the outstanding high school coaches in Texas.

At Mt. Vernon, Smith's high school basketball teams lost only three games in district play over a period of six consecutive years, winning five district championships and two regional crowns. In 1948 his team was defeated, winning the Texas school boy title.

Takes Titles

During his six year span, the great high school coach led his football teams to four district titles and one regional championship in winning 63 games and losing only 10.

In six seasons of tough competition, Smith's loss column in both football and basketball at Mt. Vernon totaled only 11, a record that will long be remembered in the eastern sector of the state.

Smith's coaching career hit its peak in the 1947-1948 season, when he had the eminent distinction of guiding undefeated teams throughout an entire school year, keeping a clean record in both football and basketball.

Becomes Coach

In 1950 Catfish became head coach and assistant football coach at E. T. S. T. when Darrell Tully resigned from that position to become head man in football at Crozier Tech high school in Dallas.

When Bob Berry resigned as head Lion football coach last spring to enter private business, Smith was named as interim coach and Jack Woodruff took over direction of the cagers.

ROTC Rifle Team Wins First Match

The rifle team of East Texas State's Air ROTC unit won its first match against the University of Oregon week before last. The local team lost its second match with the University of Oregon in the next week.

Seeking to better their 300 average, the team will travel to Tahimingo, Okla., Dec. 7 to meet the Murray State School of Agriculture team in a shoulder to shoulder match, according to M-Sgt. Sam Wilson, firing instructor.

Members of the team scheduled to make the Oklahoma trip are Davis L. Stephens, Jerry Bullock, John C. Ollins, John K. Smith and Harrold Shidley.

Regional AA Game

Will Be Played Here

Memorial stadium will be the scene of a regional AA all-star basketball game between Pittsburg and East Texas Friday night.

Pittsburg defeated Atlanta and Pleasant Grove downed Terrell in all-district contests last week.



Smith's Lions, on switching to the T formation this year, saw their offense fall to jell in the season's opener, and the Abilene Christian college Wildcats won a defensive battle, 14 to 6. The Lion offense looked better the next week as they trounced Louisiana Tech, 38 to 7. Then North Texas romped over the Lions, 48 to 7.

Lions Determined
Following the defeat by North Texas State, the Lions came to Coach Smith for a conference. They told him in no uncertain terms that they were determined not to lose another game this season. And now they have won six games in a row, defeating in succession Lamar Tech, Midwestern, Sam Houston, Howard Payne, Stephen F. Austin, South-

west Texas and Austin college. Their win week before last over the Bobcats clinched the Lone Star conference crown.

With an 8-win and 3-loss record this year, the Lions have amassed 288 points while holding the opposition to 191. During their 7-game winning streak, they rolled up 245 points to their opponents' 112.

One more game remains on the Lions' schedule for this season. They go to Alpine tomorrow to tangle with Sul Ross.

A win tomorrow would allow the Lions to end 1951 gridiron play with eight successive victories and with only seven men graduating from the squad, leave them in a good position to add to the string next season.

Although the game is a conference affair, it will have no direct bearing on the standings. Catfish Smith's Lions, winners of four previous conference starts, clinched the Lone Star conference crown two weeks ago.

E.T. will enter the contest tomorrow as a heavy favorite. This game is somewhat reminiscent of last year's meeting between the two clubs. Sul Ross, like East Texas, had already won the conference and took the field as heavy favorites. East Texas, however, rose up to tie the Lobos 7 to 7.

Nearly all the Lobo's losses have been by a narrow margin and E.T. scouts reported that the West Texans have a much better team than their record shows.

Players Rate High
Charles Laffoon, Sul Ross' fine quarterback, leads the Lone Star conference in total offense with 1,000 yards. Laffoon, halfback, is second in rushing. Stacy has averaged 6.7 yards every time he has carried the ball.

Other outstanding players for Sul Ross are Bob Boyles, Frank Harrell and Tommy Tucker in the offensive line and Wilson Hall, Lee Burnett and Dwayne Parsons on defense.

The game is expected to be a wild, high-scoring affair as E.T. is second in team offense.

Jim Pennell, acting captain for the game and local Sherman boy, showed the home folk what Austin needed in the way of a guard when he blocked one kick, partially blocked another and in general played a whale of a ball game at defensive guard and linebacker. This is the second time Jim has been chosen Lineman-of-the-Week.

The kick he blocked on the Austin four-yard line set up the first E.T. score, making things a little simpler for the offense. In the tackling department, Jim was in the opponent's hair all night. Closely pressing Pennell for this honor were two stalwart tackles, Lem Jones and D. L. Ashley.

In the backfield division, it was solid socking John Owens who ran and punted his way into

Back-of-the-Week honors. John played tailback on the Lion's spread formation, where he just about ran over everything the Kangaroos could muster in the way of a defense.

When John reached the point he couldn't run over them, then he'd kick over them, an art John has mastered very effectively. John's long booming punts were the feature of the night; they kept the enemy playing in its own back yard mud puddle all night.

The team elected the season's captains Monday, and to represent East Texas as co-captains for the '51 season will be seniors Charles "Hoss" Stewart and Jack Hetherington. They will lead the team in the final game tomorrow.

Tackle Hears Wedding Bells

Wedding bells will be ringing for veteran tackle Lem Jones as soon as possible after hanging his mole-skins up. The date is not definite yet, but it will probably be sometime before Christmas.

Three boys who may be out of uniform at Alpine due to lime burns suffered in the Austin College tussle are James Coble, Forrest Fawcett and possibly Jim Pennell. All three suffered burns

enough to be hospitalized. Pennell's burn is on his leg, while Coble and Fawcett each received burns on the side and hip. Their absence will be keenly felt.

Being Lone Star Conference champs and having one of the best records in the state could result in a bowl bid. There are several minor bowls which have not announced contestants yet, maybe E.T. will be considered. I was thinking in terms of the West Coast. Possible?

Last Year's Situation Reversed

Last year when the East Texans played Sul Ross on Dec. 2, we did not possess a very effective record; we had already lost the conference and had nothing to gain by beating the Lobos but the prestige of whipping the champs before a home crowd. On the other hand, Sul Ross had already won the conference, had the same record we beat today (8-2) and had little prestige to gain by beating off-beaten East Texas and everything to lose in case of a defeat.

Result: a hard fought, exciting football game that resulted in a 7-7 deadlock. This year

the situation is reversed, the Lions are the champions. Sul Ross is the off-beaten eleven that is playing before the home crowd for what little prestige might be gained by beating the champs. Although the Lobos have lost more than their share of games, their offense has still been able to grind out an average of over 300 yards in every game this season. They have one of the best quarterbacks in the small college circuit and a group of seniors who would probably like to go out in a blaze of glory. My prediction: with a little luck, East Texas by a 20 to 14 margin.

Cagers Lose Opener To Midwestern U.

A smooth as silk East Texas quintet scared the pants off the unbeaten Midwestern university Indians in Wichita Falls Wednesday night as the Lions dropped their opener 67 to 61.

The Lions dominated the game except for the last six minutes of play. The E.T. five held a 39 to 31 lead at the half and at one time in the first half were ahead by 19 points. O'Neal Weaver dropped in 20 points in the first half to keep the Indians in the ball game.

With Shorty Sholars, Rynn Smith and Buddy Taylor bopping the meshes consistently from the opening tip-off to the end, the Lions almost made a run-away of the game.

Sholars made 83 per cent of his shots as he dropped 16 points. Smith scored 13 points with a 67 per cent average and was closely followed by Buddy Taylor and Joe Earl with 9 and 8 points each. The team average was 24 shots made out of 50 shots attempted for a 48 per cent average.

Lions Beat Bobcats 28-21 To Cinch L. S. C. Crown

East Texas Lions, on Marvin Brown's All-American performance, came from behind to beat Southwest Texas 28 to 21 and clinch the Lone Star Conference championship. The Lions have one conference game left but have clinched the conference crown in that every other team has lost two conference games and the Lions are undefeated in conference play.

Brown started his scintillating performance as he caught a James Gray pass from 30 yards out and raced over with 30 seconds left in the first half. The Bobcats already had a 14 to 0 lead on Leo Chaffin's drive from the 1 and a Pence Dacus to E. J. Swindler pass that tallied from the 38 yard line.

It looked like a new ball game as the second half began with the Lions driving deep into Bobcat territory before a fourth down drive paid off with Charles "Hoss" Stewart going the final foot for the counter.

The score was tied 14 all going into the last period which was filled with fireworks. On the first play Brown fielded a punt on the East Texas 13 and went all the way, 67 yards, for the untied score. With the period thirds gone, Fritz Loeffler duplicated the feat for the Bobcats from 67 yards out. Since Lloyd Corder for the Lions and Bill Wilcox for the Bobcats were perfect all night in their conversions, the score was 21-all.

But the Lions had Brown, and

with 2 minutes and 40 seconds to play the Midland Count broke through the right side of his line, got an effective block here and there and was gone 77 yards for the game-winning score.

Corder again split the uprights, and for the third successive game the Lions had come from behind to win a thriller.

Other stars besides Brown would include Gray, who pitched

his seventeenth touchdown strike of the year. Gray tops all small-college passers in the nation in this department. Corder's consistency at the conversion line kept the pressure on the Bobcats all the time. R. C. Moore, line backer, seemed to be everywhere

at once as he came up with 15 tackles and 5 assists. Therman Fynes was credited with 11 and 3, and Lucky Parker got 9 and 1. D. L. Bruno Ashley came through with another All-American tackle job as he took credit for 8 tackles and 2 assists. Other defenders ranking high were Carroll Holiday, Duncan Thompson, Cotton Martin, Jim Pennell and George "Corky" Bowling.
