Dollars Come Graduate Student's Way Via History Theme

"Such things just don't happen to country school teachers!"

That was the exclamation Mrs. Roselle Williams Crawford of Pecan Gap muttered when she received a letter from Naylor Publishing company accepting her manuscript for publication.

The result, "Survival of Legends," will be premiered in the Student Co-op Book store at East Texas State college Monday, June 23. At this time, Mrs. Crawford, a student in the college, will autograph copies of her publication.

Term Papers
And, in further describing the accident of becoming an author, the English teacher describes how she wrote three term papers as a requirement in a course in southwestern history. When Dr. Robert L. Jones, professor of history, called Mrs. Crawford to his office and asked her to re-do the bibliography. The professor suggested that she submit the papers to Naylor.

Doubtful, but always one to follow instructions, the Pecan

Gap English teacher packed the manuscript and mailed it to the San Antonio concern. Within ten days, Mrs. Crawford held an acceptance letter.

No Recipe
"I can't give a recipe for writing a book because I didn't know that I was writing one at the time I thought I was merely writing term papers, and I was doing my best to make an 'A,'" comments the brunette whose bobbed hair is touched with silver.

"I do know that writing a volume means a great deal of work. While one is teaching, sponsoring class activities and keeping house, there isn't much time for writing. But I've learned that the night is still young after 1 a. m."

Mrs. Crawford recalls that often after chaperoning her students on hayrides or parties, she has returned to her home for an

appointment with pencils and notebook paper. And she remembers too the numerous times she remained in the library at East Texas State until closing time.

Legend and Folklore
The author's interest in legends and folklore isn't new. From the time that she memorized "The Midnight Ride of Paul Revere," Mrs. Crawford was interested in tales of old, the stories handed down by mouth from one generation to another. She explains that this interest was kindled and kept alive through professors at East Texas State college. In a course under Dr. Earl Sauder, head of the department of English, and in a history of the southwest class under Dr. Jones, Mrs. Crawford added to her already keen appreciation of old-told tales.

"Although these stories are



not always true, they do give us a deep insight into the beliefs, whims, fancies and customs of those who came before us," she states.

Covers 11-State Area
Represented in the volume are folktales of every race in the southwest, and the book covers an 11-state area. Sketches were done by Mrs. Crawford's son, who is doing indocrinatology at Lackland air base.

The author is doing work toward her master's degree at East Texas State college and is a former student of Baylor university and Texas State college for women. She received her high school education at Pittsburg.

A Friend in Deed

Of the many personalities on the campus of East Texas State Teachers college, perhaps one of the most sympathetic and helpful to students is Ota Farris, college nurse.

"Farris," as most of the students affectionately call her, has had a great deal to do with building health on the campus as well as morale. Many a student has been picked up out of the dumps after a visit with the red-headed Nightingale.

Miss Farris is always a friend to students, but especially when the student needs her. She is certainly "a friend in deed."

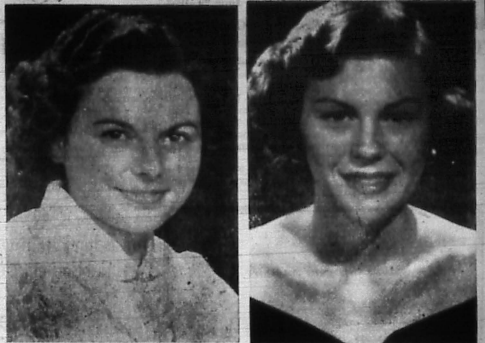
