# Senior Student Gets Chance in Big League

C. R. (Fireball) McPherson, senior student from Hughes Springs, has joined the ranks of the future E.T. greats. After a trip to Oklahoma to try out with the Paul's Valley baseball club, Fireball, as he is known by his friends, came home with a contract to join the New York Giants at their spring-training camp in Melburn, Florida, in February.

He had a great deal of trouble getting a contract, with a ball club because of his size, since he is only five feet eight inches tall and weighs only 135 pounds. Several major league teams told him that they would sign him if he weighed from fifteen to twenty pounds more, but "Fireball" did not let this lack of size bother him; he just kept working on his sweeping curves and fast ball until he had them down to near-perfection.

When Bobby Shantz of the Philadelphia Athletics, the smallest man in the majors, became such a great pitcher, major league scouts decided that little men could become great baseball pitchers. This fact has given "Fireball" his chance at gaining a baseball contract.

Only eighteen years old, he consistently signs contracts with major league teams.

If you see a long, cigar-shaped object around the campus, don't be alarmed. It is just Joe Bill, the mascot of the East Texas State Teachers College.

Billman, graduate student of Ft. Worth, got the idea for making the boat from a Boy Scout magazine when he was 13 years old. He ordered the plans and finally got around to beginning actual construction last summer. He completed the job about two weeks ago.

The boat is made of plywood strips, mahogany strips and 11-ounce canvas, which forms the shell. Canvas sealer and stretcher was applied and then three coats of bright red canoe paint were put on.

The kayak is 13 feet long, two and one-half feet wide and weighs approximately 35 pounds. Total cost of materials was \$15. The mahogany strips were obtained from the scrap pile of a Dallas boat factory.

Before Billman took his canoe on its shakedown cruise, his wife made him get a life preserver. Not that she didn't have utmost confidence in the boat and its operation. She was just playing it safe.

On the first tryout, the home-made vessel threw Billman twice, pipe, glasses and all. He says he is about to catch onto its tricks now and he manages to stay afloat fairly well. The reason it tries to roll over, explains Billman, is that it sits so high in the water. He is now building pontoons to help hold it "up" side up.

The graduate student teaches science in the Dallas school system. He is working on his master's degree this summer.

Reason he wanted to build a boat of this type is that it is so light and easy to handle. One man can easily load it on top of a car. He plans to use it for fly rod and trout fishing.
