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# TRINITY CONFERS WHITLEY DEGREE

Dr. S. H. Whitley, president of the East Texas State Teachers College, received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from the Trinity University of Washington, Tuesday morning. Horace Wilson Morelock, president of the "Old West" Teachers College of Alaska, also received the same honor.

Mr. Whitley, who was born in Cleburne in 1873, has both his B. L. and a D. A. degree from Trinity University, his M. A. from Southern Methodist University and his Litt. D. degree from Austin College of Sherman.

After teaching in rural schools from 1901 to 1909, Mr. Whitley taught at Corsicana until 1914, when he became First Assistant State Superintendent of Public Instruction. He remained in this position until 1919 when he accepted a place as dean of the East Texas State Teachers College. He was elected president of the college in 1924.

After receiving his L. I. degree from Peabody Normal College and his B. A. degree from the University of Tennessee, President Morelock came to Texas in 1903 as superintendent of the Keokuk schools. When the West Texas State Teachers College was established at Canyon in 1924, Mr. Morelock was named head of the English department.

 The enrollment of the North Texas State Teachers College has reached 323 according to a report given in the Dallas Morning News, Sunday. This surpasses last summer's enrollment by over one hundred. The total registration is expected to reach in the neighborhood of 3,380.

## Facts and Figures on Enrollment Show Increase in Student Body

A 210 is a decided increase in enrollment as compared with the 210 who attended East Texas in 1929. The registration has grown steadily in order to swell its number to the present mark. In 1930 the winter enrollment was 375, with a summer student body of 280.

An increase was made in the winter of 1919-20, the summer enrollment, reached 490. The year 1920 showed a marked increase to 673 for the winter term and 910 for the summer term.

The following year the student body reached its thousand mark when there were 1069 winter students and 1282 summer students. In the winter of 1922 the enrollment reached 1,200, but dropped to 1,273 for the summer of '24. Again it mounted up to 1,811 for the 1925 summer term and to 1,820 for the 1925 winter term, and to 1,850 for the summer of 1926.

A slight decrease was made during the winter term of 1926 when only 1,513 students attended the college; but the summer enrollment reached 1,600. This year students enrolled. There were 1,879 enrolled for the winter of 1927, and 1,879 for the summer term. This was the largest enrollment in the history until the present term. While as yet this term has not quite 2,200 it is larger than the registration at this time last summer.

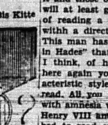

## REGISTRAR EXPLAINS FACTS ABOUT NEW CONSTITUTION LAW

With reference to the new Constitution course which has been entered in the curriculum and which has caused much argument and comment, Miss Francis Selby, Registrar, gives the following information:

Students who receive their degrees in August and students who receive certificates in January are required to have Social Science 215; but it will be required for a certificate of any kind issued after September 1. At the beginning of the fall term Social Science will be changed to 221 and included in the regular Government course. However, students who have completed this course, which is now known as Social Science 22-23, must take the Social Science 215 to fulfill the new law requirements.
