When a powerful and far-seeing leader is at the head of a progressive school system, it is found to reach out into new fields and succeed. This is what we, as teachers, are most interested in. Superintendent G. D. Staton of Wills Point public schools tells to the other two thousand teachers now enrolled in this college what he is doing toward the promotion of his school system.

Two full years of Home Economics is offered and a third is to be added next year. Plans are being made for the installation of Industrial Education and Shop Work for the boys. All these additions are in direct line with the ideals and practical aims of modern education.

"This High School," says Mr. Staton, "is attempting to serve a large territory, drawing pupils from about thirty different school districts. This is a great attempt to give something of educational value to all the children of the people who are within the reach of the school."

Mr. Staton is striving to give to his High School students a training that will reach as near as possible, his idea of the aim of education which is to develop personalities so that they may be more powerful and have more influence in their surroundings.
