Dr. Taylor stated also that once the teeth were out of order the entire system is subject to disorder. The lecture was very educational, and was the first of such lessons that have been brought to the students this year.

### PRE-REGISTRATION BEGINS THURS., NOVEMBER 15TH

All students now registered in the college will be expected to make out their schedules for the Winter quarter before the Fall quarter closes.

Opportunity will be given students to register for the Winter quarter beginning November 15, and ending November 27. Students will be expected to get copy of the schedule, together with two schedule cards from the Registrar's office, one for their own use and one for the use of the office. Students are requested not to get more than two cards, and it is suggested that they do not get them until they are ready to complete their schedule. They will be less likely to misplace or lose the cards. There is a great waste of these cards and printed schedules, due to carelessness. Students are urged to attend to this promptly. Students will ten take these cards to their respective teachers. Each teacher will be expected to OK the student's work that will be placed in his supervision to illustrate, the teacher of Biology III will put his OK on the student's schedule. If the student registers for Biology 112, The OK will be placed on the same line with the subjects under it ahead of remarks. After students have completed scheduling, one schedule card will be filed in the Registrar's office not later than 5 p. m. Wednesday, Nov. 27th. At the beginning of the Winter quarter these students will report to the Secretary's Office to pay their fees. Students will be expected to register for the next course at the same hour and with the same teacher, if possible. This will enable the office to keep the sections level and eliminate overcrowding. However, such changes as may be necessary to keep the sections level, will be made in the Registrar's Office.

All students for the new term will pay their fees on December 30th and January 1st. New students, or students coming in, who have not been here during the Fall term, will register the same as heretofore. Faculty committees will be organized during the first week of the new term to make out schedules for new students only. New students, therefore, should bring a student information card from the Deans' Office.

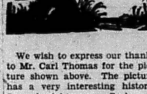
