## Constitution Of The Dandy Lions

Through the courtesy of Curtis Cameron, President of the Dandy-Lions, the constitution of the Club is being published herein in order that the present members and prospective members may become fully acquainted with the law and purposes of the Club.

**Article One: (Name)**  
The organization shall be known as the Dandy-Lions.

**Article Two: (Purposes)**  
The purpose of this Club shall be to support all forms of school activities, to develop true sportsmanship, fellowship and cooperation among the student body.

**Article Three: (Membership)**  
Section One: Membership of this organization shall be limited to bona-fide students of the College Department of the College.

**Section Two: Membership in the Club** may be obtained by submitting the student's names to the Club meeting. At the next regular meeting a vote shall be taken and the student is elected by a majority vote.

**Article Four: (Officers)**  
Section One: Officers of the Club shall be composed of President, Secretary, Treasurer, Reporter and Sergeant-at-Arms.

**Section Two: The President** of the Club shall be elected from the active membership and shall have been members of the Club for at least three school terms.

**Article Five: Election of Officers**  
Elections shall be held regularly on the second meeting of

those elected shall take office the day of election.  
**Article Seven: (Amendments)**  
Amendments to this constitution may be proposed to the Organization which shall become valid to all intents and purposes as a part of the constitution, when ratified by the two-thirds majority of the members and approved by the President of the Institution of which the Club is a part.

**By-Laws**  
Article One: The Dandy Lion Club will meet regularly each Tuesday at five o'clock in M. T. during the Fall and Winter terms, and shall have call meetings when the officers shall see it to call same.

**Article Two: Dues for the Dandy-Lions Club** shall be \$50 each school term and shall be paid each term on or before the second meeting of the Club.

**Article Three:** Any member of the Dandy-Lions are to report only when authorized by the officers of the Club and any member of the Club following any person outside the Club to wear his uniform is automatically dropped from the Club.

**Article Four:** Any member of the Club must remove the Lion emblem from the front of the sweater.
